A photographer will be on site for pictures. Schools may bring any materials for a display table that will be setup in the dining hall for attendees to view.

NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF BLACK HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI (NCABHSA)

Most of the former African-American high schools in North Carolina, including those located in Edgecombe, Nash and surrounding counties, closed their doors between 1969 and 1973 in response to the desegregation plan set forth by the state of North Carolina. Shortly after that time, active alumni groups of those schools were established and have existed since the early to mid 1970s. These alumni associations are well organized and strong in their determination to stay connected, to make a difference among our youth and to keep the history and memory of their schools alive within the communities.

The schools listed below were among the many affected by the closures and are the charter schools of the North Carolina Association of Black High School Alumni (NCABHSA) established July 2008. Although Brick School was not a part of the state's action at that time, it holds a special place in the African American educational history of the state. Brick School was the forerunner of several area high schools including Phillips in Edgecombe County, Swift Creek in Nash County and Inborden in Halifax County.



NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF BLACK HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI (NCABHSA)

Eight of the former African-American high schools of Edgecombe and Nash County closed their doors between 1969 and 1973 in response to the desegregation plans set forth by the state of North Carolina. Shortly after that time, active alumni groups of those schools were established and have existed since the mid-seventies. These alumni associations are well organized and strong in their determination to stay connected, make a difference among youth and to keep the history and memory of their schools alive within their communities. These eight are the charter members of the North Carolina Association of Black High School Alumni (NCABHSA).

Although Brick School was not a part of the state's desegregation action at that time, having been closed in 1933 as a school, it holds a special place in the area's African American educational history. Brick was the forerunner of several of these high schools, including Phillips in Edgecombe County, Swift Creek in Nash County and Inborden in Halifax County.

Brick School, a private institution funded by the American Missionary Association and the philanthropy of Mrs. Julia Brick, was among one of the earliest secondary schools that served the African-American community in Edgecombe and surrounding counties in Eastern North Carolina. It originated in 1895 with 54 students attending through grade four. At one time it had as many as 490 students. In 1926, it became a junior college and was the only place African Americans could get a secondary education in the area. It was the first accredited secondary school for African Americans in North Carolina.

Unfortunately, Brick was forced to close in 1933 due to the economic hardships of the great depression.

Shortly after the closure of Brick, the AMA transferred its school building to the three surrounding county boards of education in Edgecombe, Nash and Halifax for use as a public high school known as the Tri-County High School. In 1946, the building housing high school students on the campus was destroyed by a fire resulting from a boiler malfunction. The Tri-County high school students who were attending Brick continued their schooling in local African American churches until Phillips High School was constructed in 1949 in Battleboro. Less than a year a later, Swift Creek (1950) and Inborden (1950) high schools were opened to accommodate the Nash and Halifax county students. Other schools in Nash County built for African Americans included Nash County Training School and C.C. Spaulding. Edgecombe County's Conetoe had actually been built for white students in that area but was turned over to African Americans living in the southern end of the county in 1948 due to its dwindling enrollment of whites. Public schools, Booker T. Washington and W.A. Pattillo had been established in the early 1920's and served African Americans living within the city limits of Rocky Mount and Tarboro, respectively. G.W. Carver, located in Pinetops, was built in 1941 severing Edgecombe County African American students in the northwest county area.

After closure, each of these high schools formed an alumni association or alumni organization with numbers ranging from less than a hundred to over 400 members. They meet regularly to conduct business, to fellowship, and to structure projects that will support the college endeavors of graduating seniors and the success of other school children. Many of those projects have involved contributing and raising money for scholarships, donating school supplies, library books, sports uniforms, fieldtrips and mentoring. Many scholarships are awarded during annual school reunions which are generally held at various times of the year from May to November. These annual reunions have spurned even greater connections with more individual class reunions, newsletters, websites, email accounts, Facebook pages and recently, the formation of the NCABHSA (North Carolina Association of Black High School Alumni) in July 2008.

The purpose of NCABHSA is to link Black high school alumni association members, graduates, teachers and attendees for the purpose of carrying out its mission "to preserve the history of Black high schools in the state of North Carolina, to engage in educational partnerships that will promote and distribute support to our youth".

The original eight charter schools of the organization (listed below) continue to be joined by new member schools each year from counties surrounding Edgecombe and Nash. The hope of the organization is to expand its future membership to include as many of the once 249 former Black high schools as possible that once existed through out the state of North Carolina. – *NCABHSA History Committee*
